Four Talks for our Members are planned for 2019.

Monday 25 March A Talk on the Berry Golf Course

On Monday 25 March, at 10.00 am, there will be an update for Members on the Society's activities, followed by an informative talk on the Berry Golf Course and the sport of golfing in Berry. Our very own Nancy Bevan will be sharing this information with us as we continue our search through Berry's rich history. There will be a light morning tea after the talk.

There will also be a member talk on Berry Race Course later in the year. The date for this talk is still to be advised.

Annis & George Bills Horse Trough

On the corner of Prince Alfred and Queen Streets, Berry, is an example of an Annis and George Bills Horse Trough. Annis and George Bills made their money from slumber rest mattresses. They were a married couple with no children and they had a great interest in animal welfare. When George Bills died, he left his estate to fund a humble, yet remarkable community initiative.

Bills horse troughs are watering troughs that were manufactured in Australia and installed to provide relief for working horses in the first half of the twentieth century.

One of the things that the Bills thought important, was to see that when a horse came into town there was somewhere for the horse to have a drink. Hence the Annis and George Bills trough.

The troughs were more likely to be placed at the entrance to a town, so after a long ride, the horse could slake its thirst at the trough. Many of the troughs also had a dog bowl attached on the end of them, so dogs had somewhere to drink too.

The trough here in Berry is one of around 700 horse troughs distributed around Australia, and 50 more overseas. You can see the dog bowl on the right hand side of the trough.

The plaque on the front of the trough reads:

DONATED BY ANNIS & GEORGE BILLS AUSTRALIA

According to the Monument Australia website, troughs were donated in memory of the horses that did not return from World War One. At the end of the WWI, Australians had 13,000 surplus horses which could not be returned home for quarantine reasons. Of these, 11,000 were sold, the majority as remounts for the British Army in India. The rest were considered too old or infirm. Only one horse, "Sandy", was returned home. "Sandy" had belonged to Major General Sir William Bridges who was killed at Gallipoli.

Ernest Shackleton - Postscript

We have had many visitors to the Museum over the summer break, with many specifically coming to see the Shackleton exhibit. While this exhibit has now finished, you can find more information on the BBC News website.

On the 27th January, the BBC News website featured an article about a new scientific expedition which has set out to find Shackleton's lost ship, the *Endurance*.

Those who are familiar with Shackleton's amazing escape from Antarctica will know that Shackleton never made it to terra firma on this, his third visit to the Antarctic. The *Endurance* was trapped in ice, was crushed and eventually sank in the Weddell Sea.

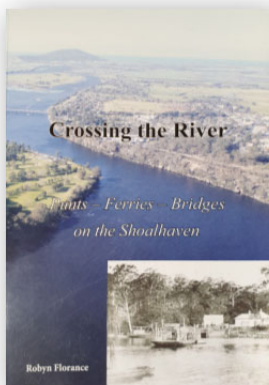
