Launch of The Green Plaques Project

On the 29th June, the Green Plaques Project was launched at the Berry Museum. Vice President Nancy Bevan opened the occasion and welcomed the many guests.

Shoalhaven City Mayor, Cr Amanda Findley officially unveiled the project and congratulated the Berry and District Historical Society on their work. The Mayor spoke of her interest in local Aboriginal history and heritage. Councillor John Wells also attended the function.

Royal Australian Historical Society Councillor, Bruce Baskerville, gave a talk on

commemorative plaques.

Eleven plaques have been installed on some of our most notable historic buildings, and the owners or managers of many of these buildings were present or represented.

Also present were representatives of Shoalhaven Council Tourism and the Berry Community Arts Centre, both sponsors of the Project.

Special Exhibition – Berry Garden Club

Berry Garden Club is celebrating its 40th anniversary.

The Berry Garden Club had its beginnings in the Shoalhaven Garden Club.

In 1961, the Garden Club of Australia Shoalhaven Branch was formed. Several people from Berry were foundation members of this very active club. It was blessed with a number of members who were very knowledgeable in various facets of gardening and willing to share their knowledge.

By May 1976 there were 175 members and, though not all would come to every meeting, it could make for a very crowded space.

As 30 of the members came from Berry, it seemed sensible to consider starting a club in Berry, thereby giving Nowra more room to move. This proposal was discussed at a meeting held on July 13, 1977, at the Berry Primary School. All were in favour of forming a club.

The Berryites were quite an enthusiastic group and have remained so, hence they are now celebrating their 40th anniversary.

Public Lecture by Donald Napper

William Wilkinson Wardell: the Pope's Architect in Australia

William Wilkinson Wardell designed a significant number of Roman Catholic churches, first in England, then in Melbourne and Sydney. These churches were built in the neo-Gothic



architectural style made popular in both the UK and Australia by Augustin Pugin. Especially notable are Wardell's two Catholic cathedrals: St Patrick's in Melbourne and St Mary's in Sydney, very different cathedrals by the same architect.

In Australia, Wardell did not confine himself to just designing churches: in Melbourne, for example, he also designed the imposing Victorian Government House while in Sydney, he designed St John's College at Sydney University and the Anglo-Dutch style ASN Co warehouse in the Rocks. Also scattered around NSW, Victoria and South Australia were some twelve ES&A Bank buildings, including the one that houses our very

own Berry Museum, and those in Camberwell and Berrima. The latter two buildings were designed in the Arts & Crafts style, one that his architectural partner at that time, Walter Liberty Vernon introduced into Australia before becoming the NSW Government Architect ((in which role he designed the Berry Police station). A significant number of Wardell's buildings are now on the National Heritage List.

Donald Napper is Emeritus Professor and a past Pro-Vice-Chancellor of the College of Science and Technology at the University of Sydney. Over the years, Napper has developed an internationally recognised expertise in polymer colloids and the polymerisation processes. He has (co-)authored over 180 scientific articles in the field and is a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science (FAA) and of the Royal Australian Chemical Institute (RACI).

Following his retirement, Napper offered to be a tour guide for the National Trust. He has developed an extensive knowledge of Australian colonial architecture.




Trivia
