

Work continues on the Noah Flood Boat restoration

Saturday, 26 October saw the gathering of 21 local volunteers who arrived at the Museum to carry the NOAH out of the shed, onto the grass, roll over and return to the shed.

Due to the experience and background of shipwright and boat crew member, Jim Christadoulou, the rollover went safely and without incident.

Our thanks go to the seven Museum boat crew volunteers and the 14 local volunteers who happily gave their efforts on the day.

The oar maker, Nick Lawther, has collected the cedar timber and is preparing to make the four oars and the rudder in his workshop in Dee Why.



A replica oar and the rudder off the SHOALHAVEN boat were loaned to Berry Museum by Shoalhaven City Council and have gone with Nick to allow faithful reproduction. The boat will now be prepared for paining, utilising the same colour scheme as SCC's sister boat, Shoalhaven.

Workdays on the boat are on the first and third Tuesday of the month and crew members have already made good progress preparing the overturned hull for repainting.

Our Christmas get together was held in the West Garden. It was a luxuriant setting. Have you seen the East Garden now that the driveway tracks are in; the new hedge planted; and the grass lush and green?

A donation from the Garden Club's 2023 Gardens Festival, plus \$5000 from the Club's Beatification of Berry Fund, provided the extra we needed to proceed.

Ever-helpful Turfco donated Sir Walter Buffalo turf. A Camellia hedge has been planted along the fence line.

The planted garden will now be renovated to ensure it is in keeping with the heritage of the building.
